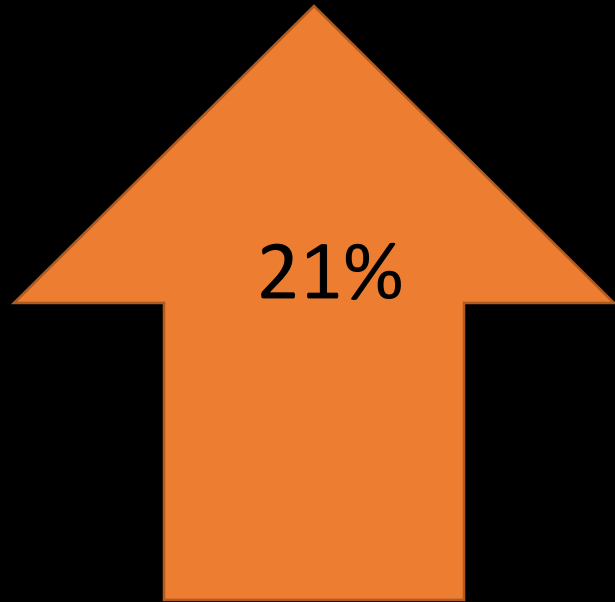


# Idaho Commission of Pardons and Parole 2018 Summary Data



# 9,232 Decisions



9,232 decisions in 2018 up from 7661 in 2017

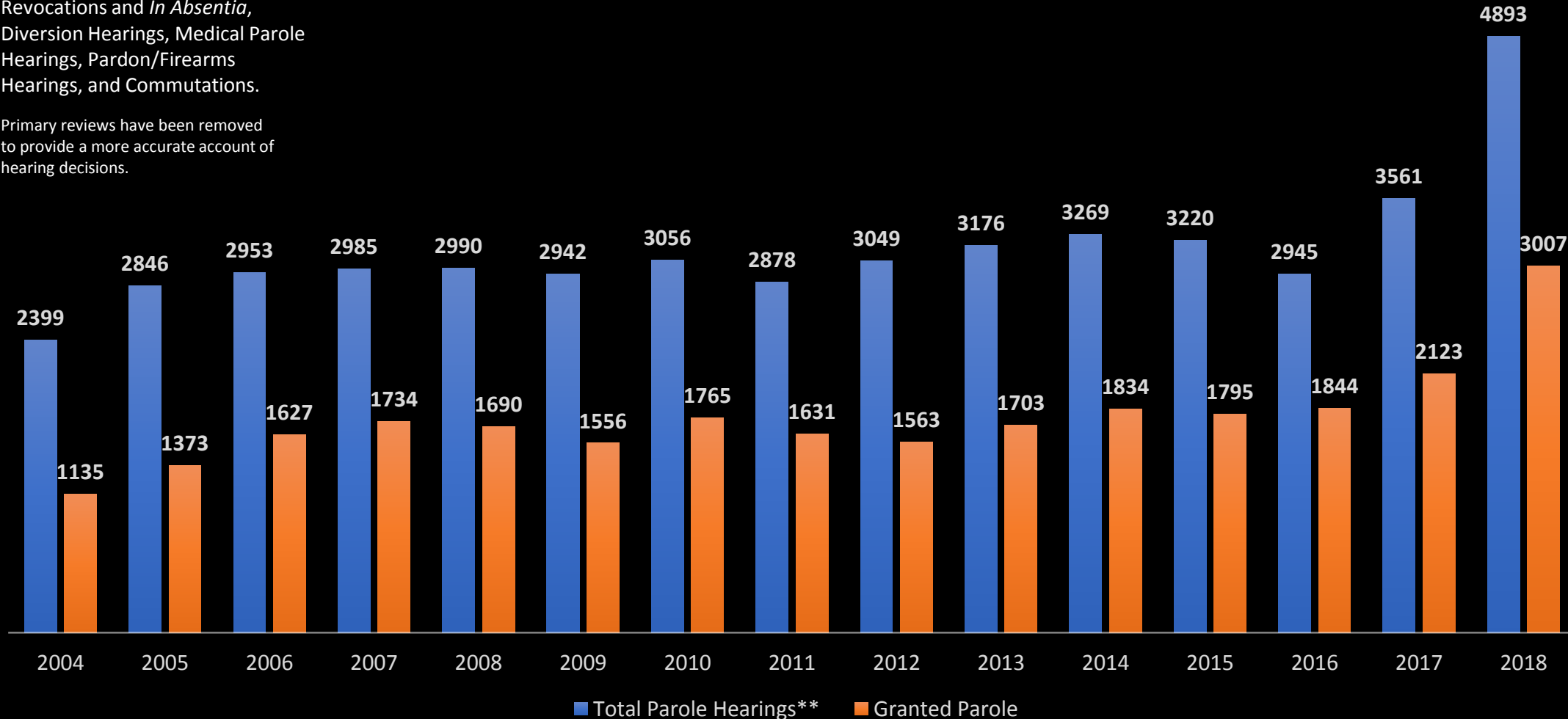
The Commission made **4,893** parole related decisions in 2018.

In addition, there were **4,339** requests processed for various other considerations, for example: requests for Early Discharge, SIPR Petitions, DOR Reviews, Misc. File Reviews, Executive Decisions & Reinstatements.

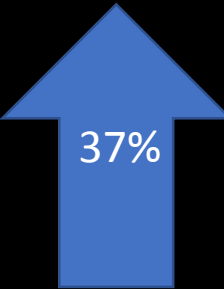
# Commission Parole Hearing Decisions

hearing decisions.

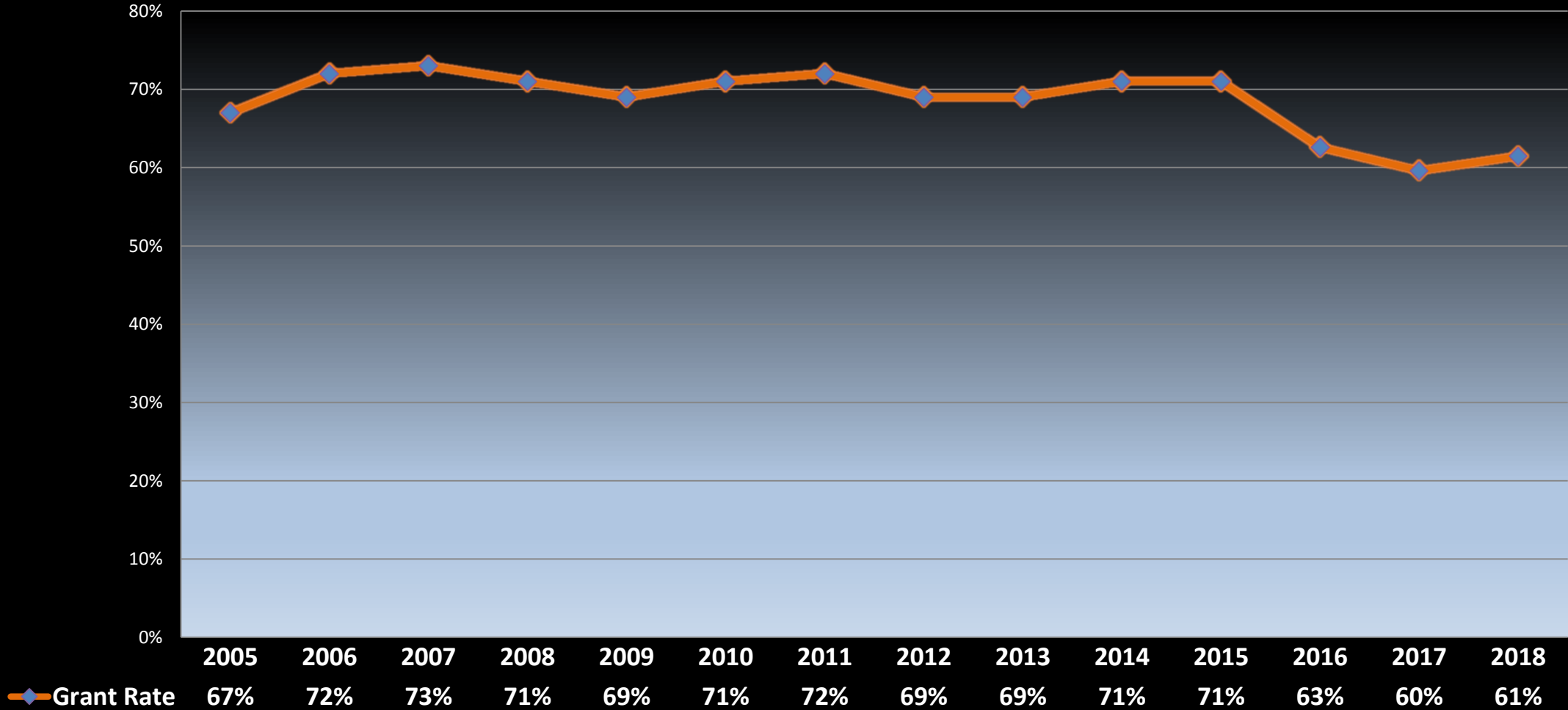


The number of hearing decisions made by the Commission increased by 37% when compared to 2017.

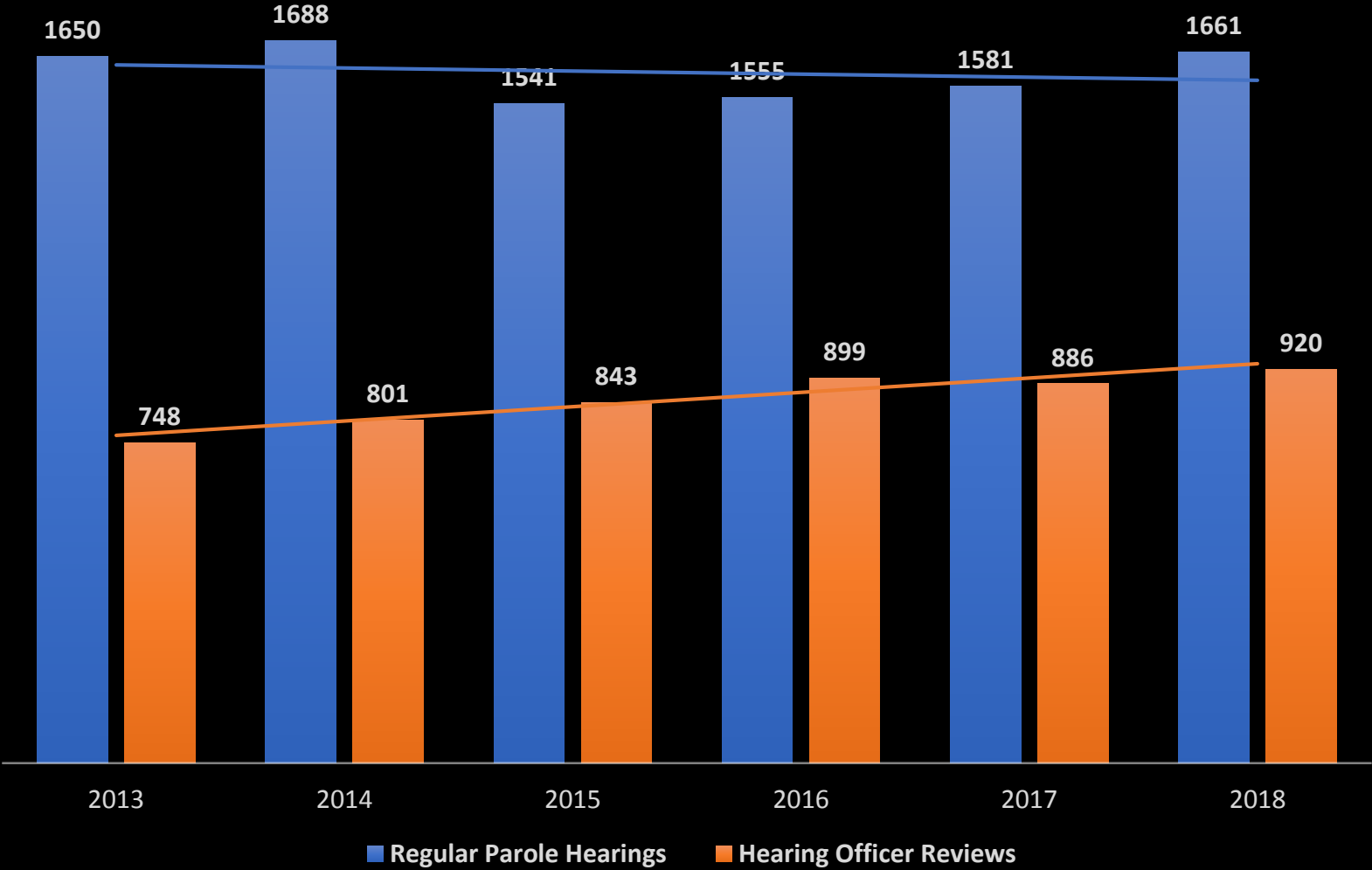


# Grant Rate

Hearings included: Regular Hearings, Hearing Officer Reviews, SIPR Hearings, Revocations and *In Absentia*, Diversion Hearings, Medical Parole Hearings, Pardon/Firearms Hearings, and Commutations.



# Regular Hearings & Hearing Officer Reviews



The number of Regular Hearings increased 5% from 2017

The number of Hearing Officer Reviews increased 4%

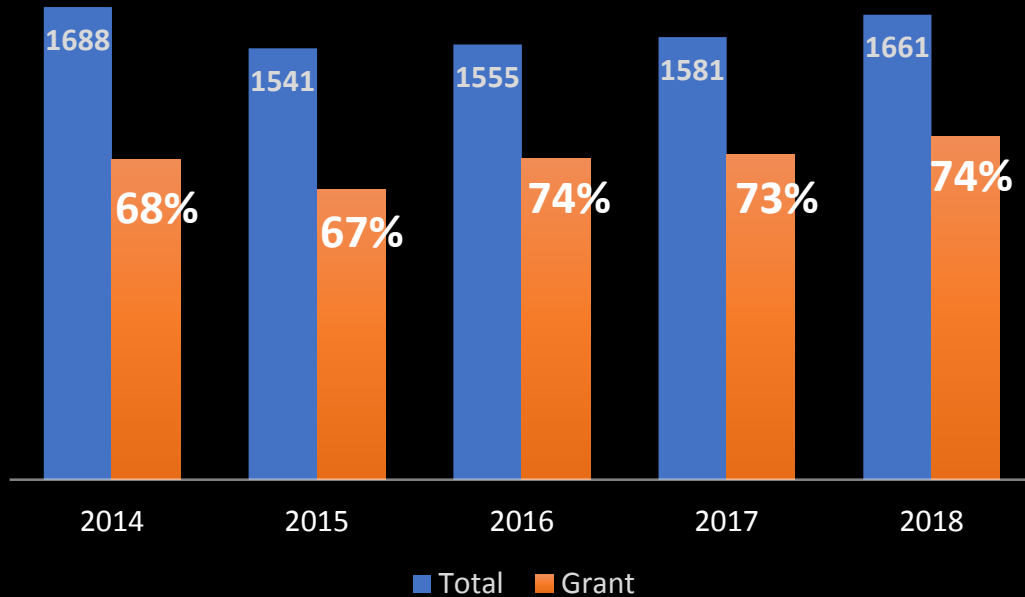


The severity of the crime dictates if an offender will appear in person before the Parole Commission.

Regular Hearings are held with the offender present in front of the Commission.

Hearing Officer Reviews do not have the offender present while the Commission considers their case.

## Grant Rate for Regular Hearings



The most common reasons for denial at a Regular Hearing are:

- Poor Institutional Behavior
- Public Safety Concerns
- Seriousness of the offense

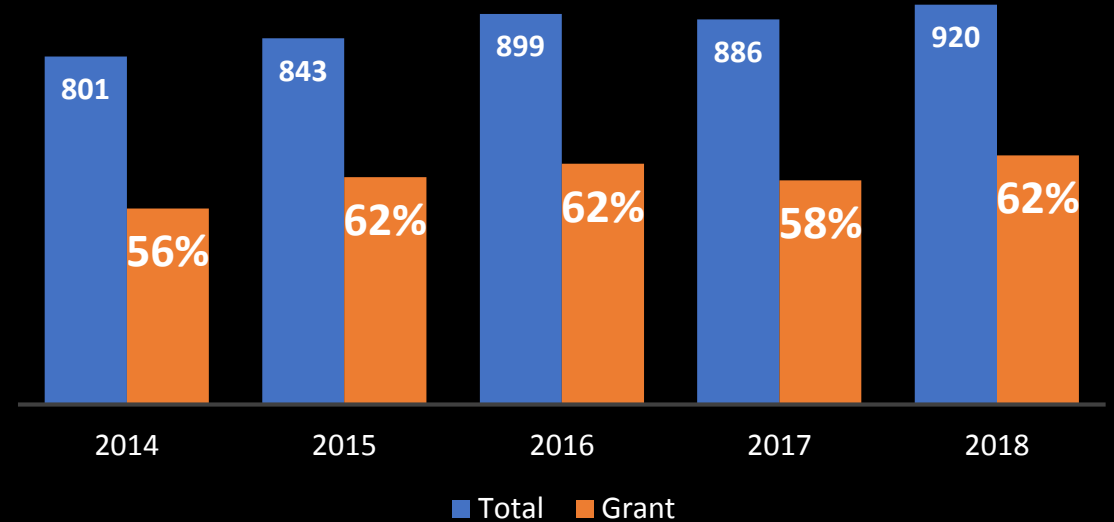
The average guideline score is 6.

A score of 10 occurs most often.

5 offenders refused parole.

2% Are passed to the Full Commission.

## Grant Rate for Hearing Officer Reviews



The most common reasons for denial at an HOR Review are:

- Poor Institutional Behavior
- Refusal to Program or Parole
- Public Safety Concerns

The average guideline score is 4.

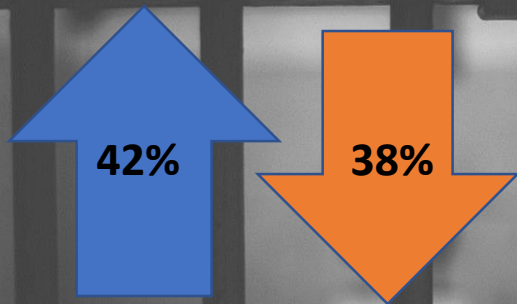
A score of 3 occurs most often.

10% of offenders refused parole.

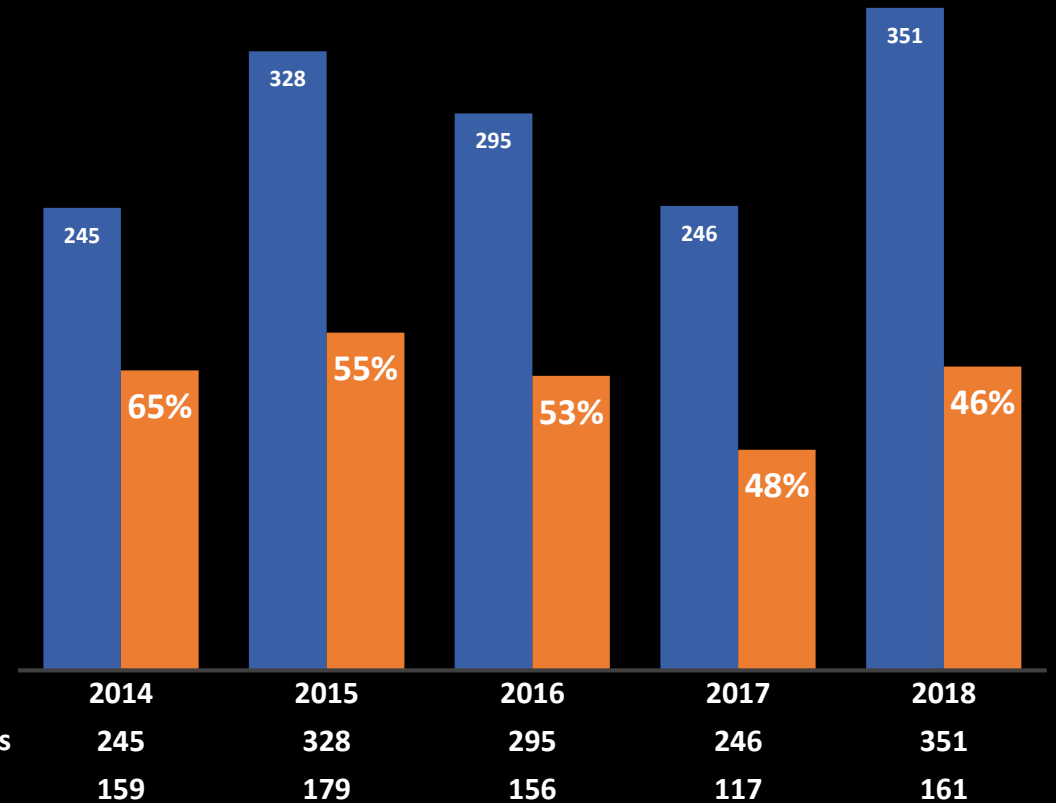
3% are rescheduled to be seen in person.

# Early Discharge Requests

Requests for Early Discharge from parole are up 42% from 2017. However, the grant rate has continued to decline steadily since 2014



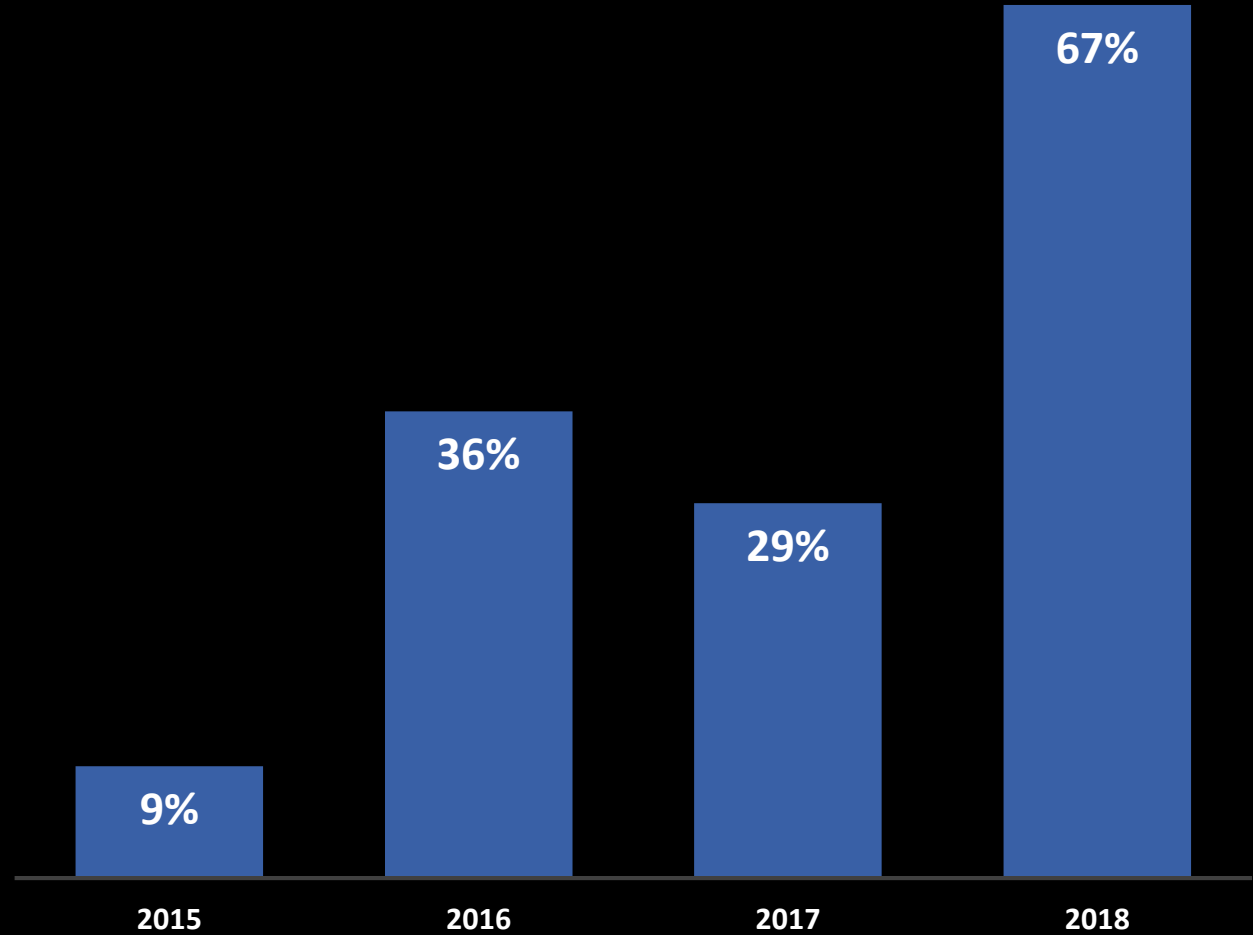
## Grant Rate for Early Discharge Requests



# Program Completion

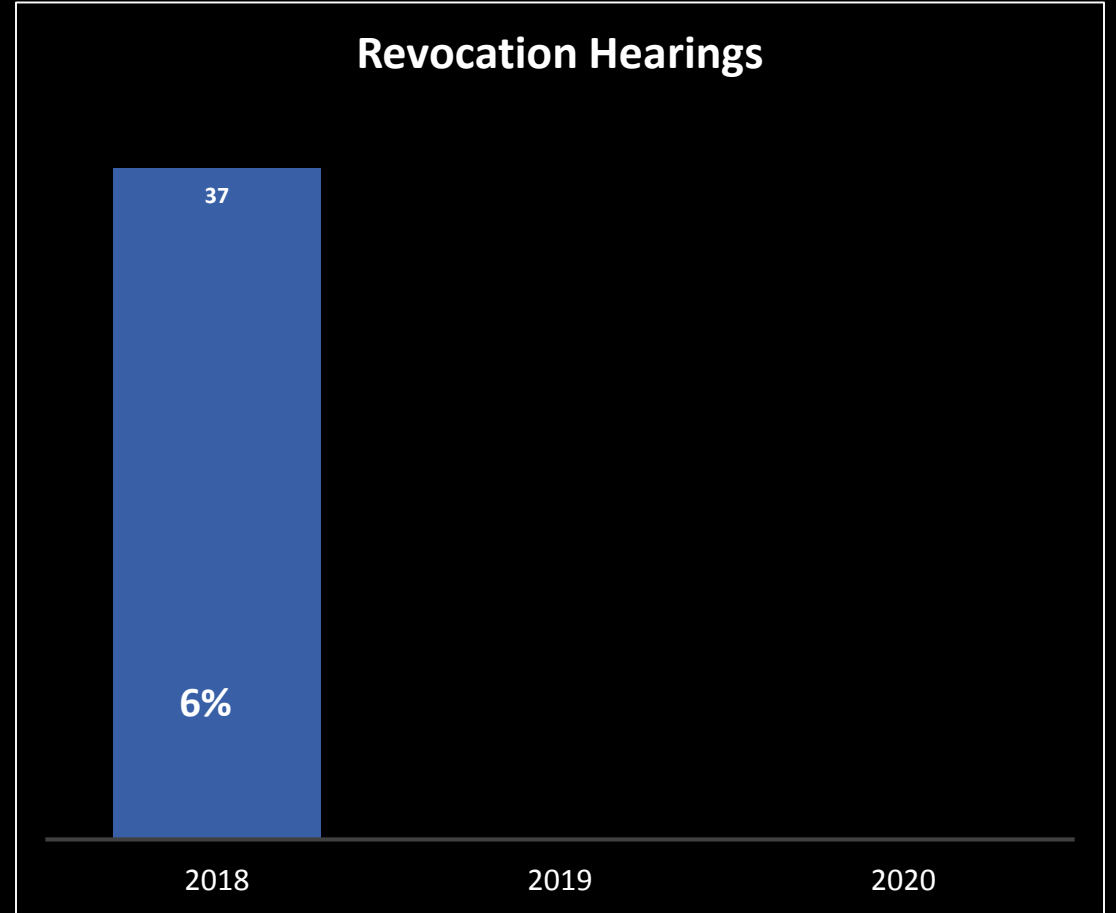
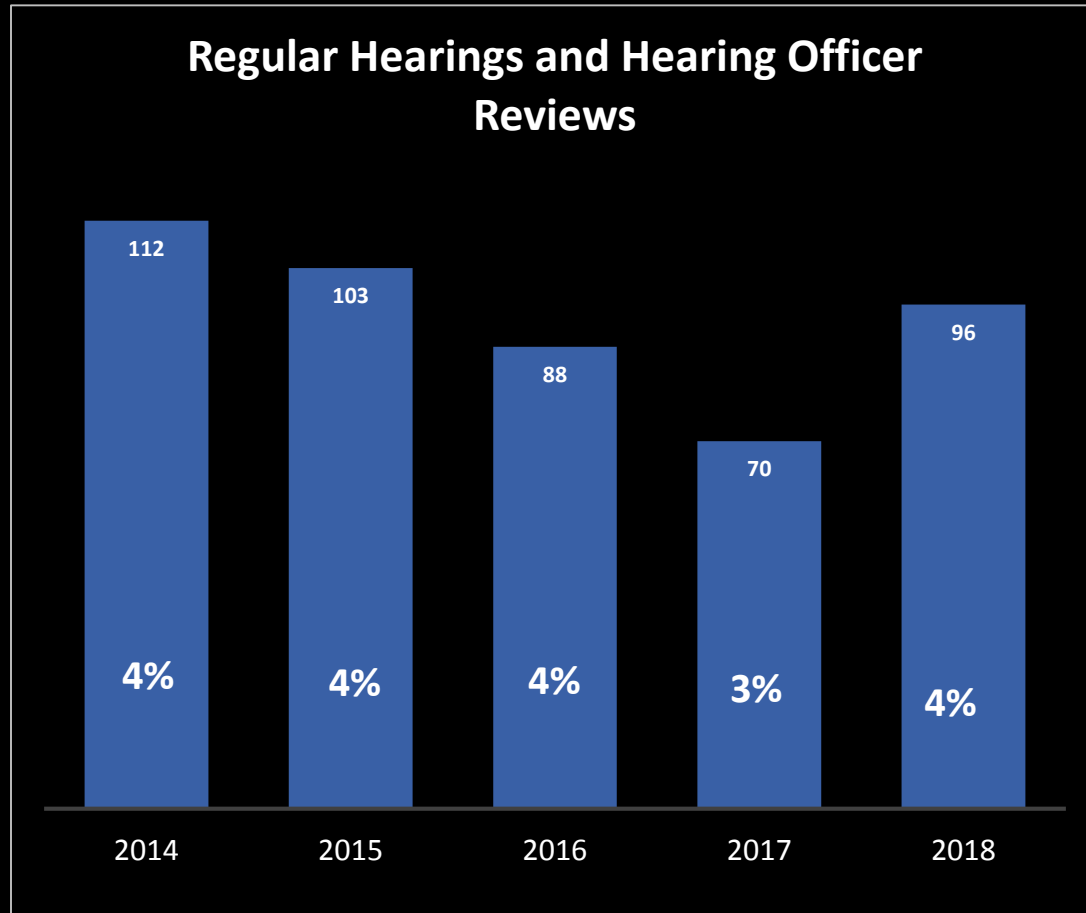
All offenders are required to complete IDOC assigned programming before being released to parole.

The number of offenders having completed their programming prior to their parole hearing **has increased 93%** from 2017.



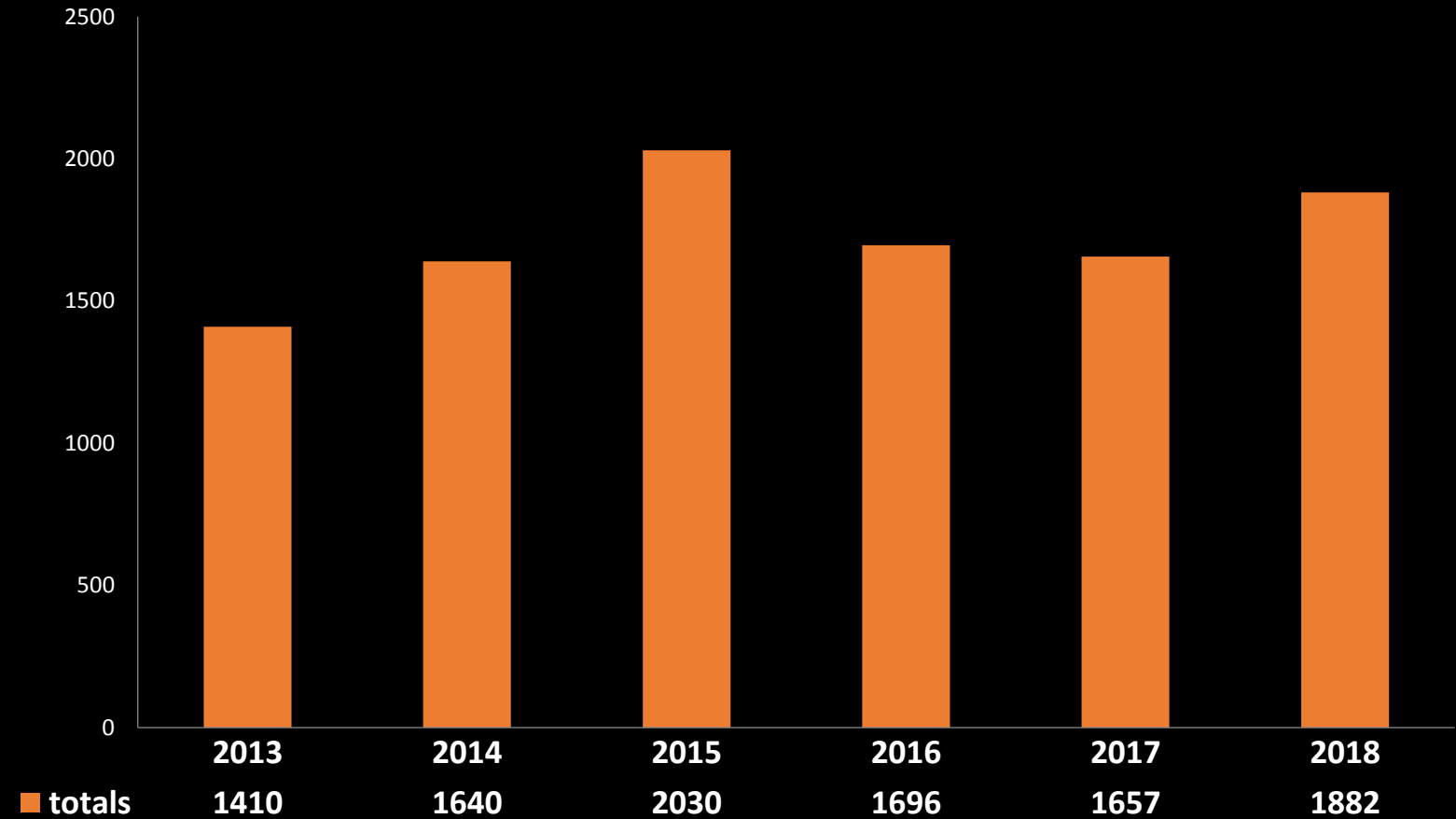


# Offenders Refusing Parole

from 2017

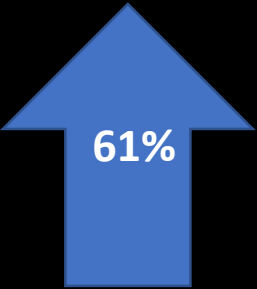
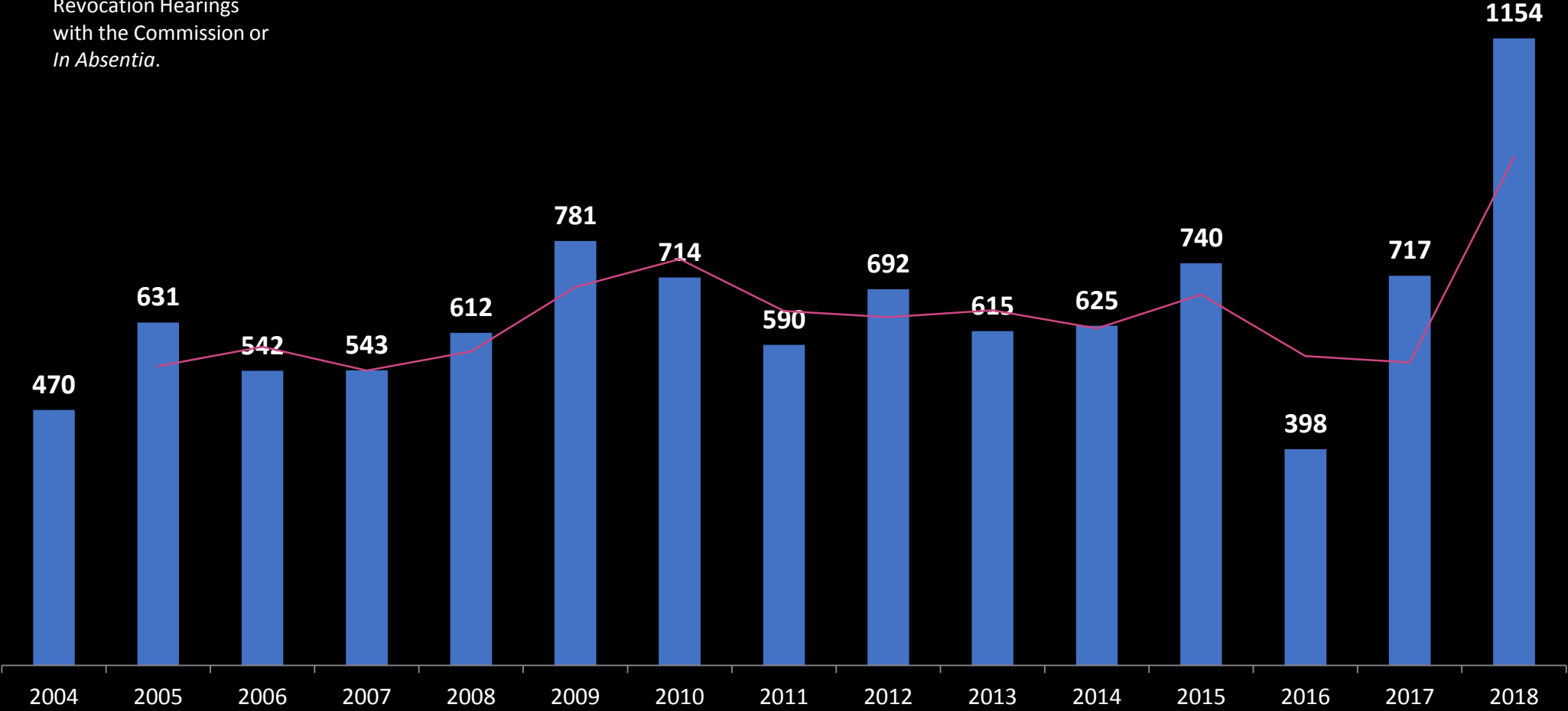

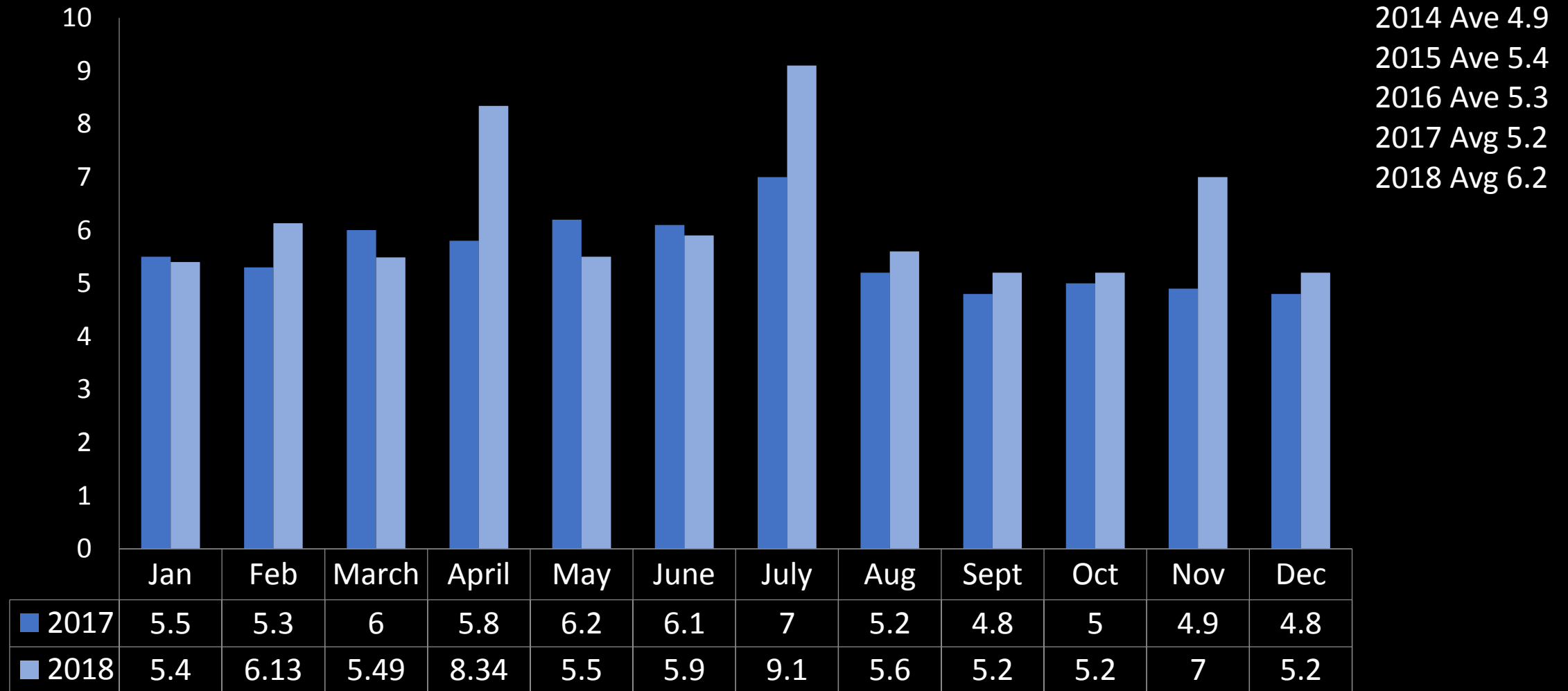

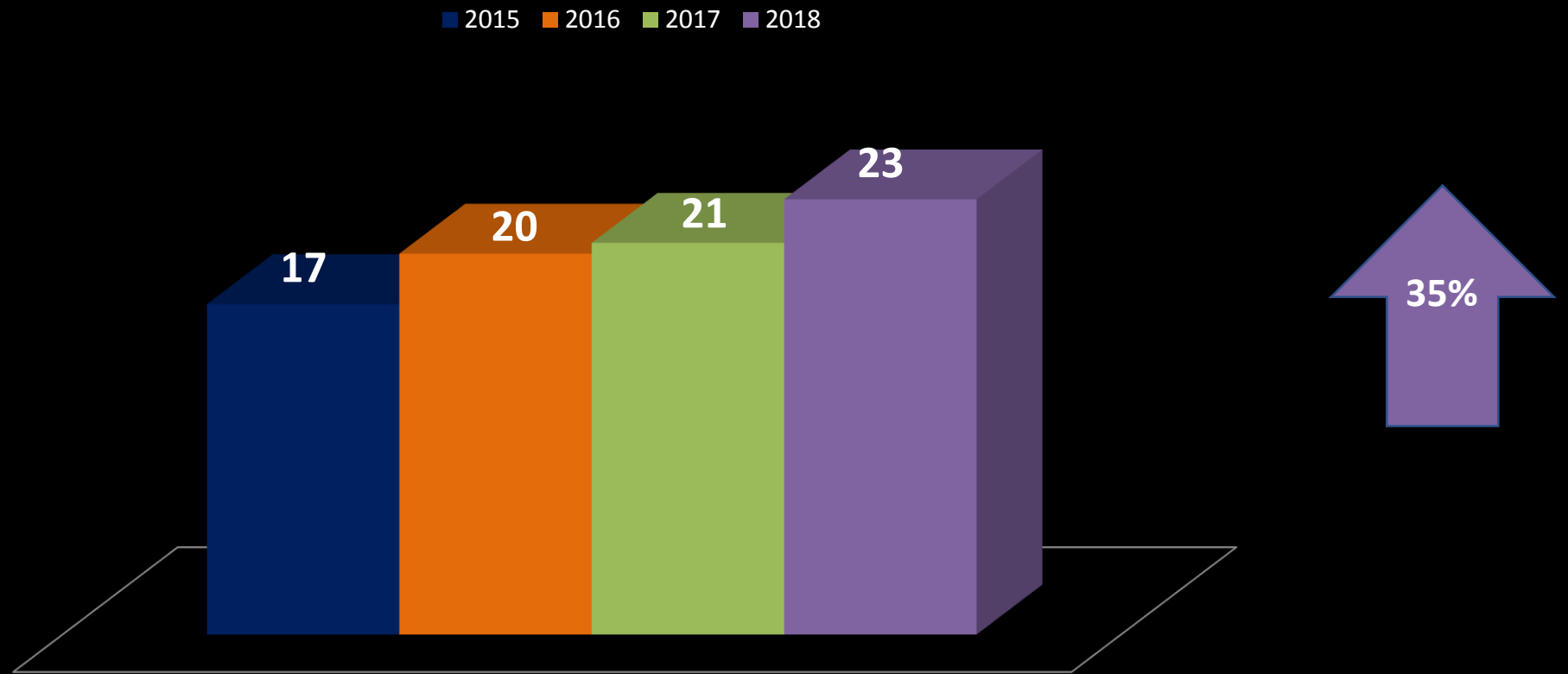


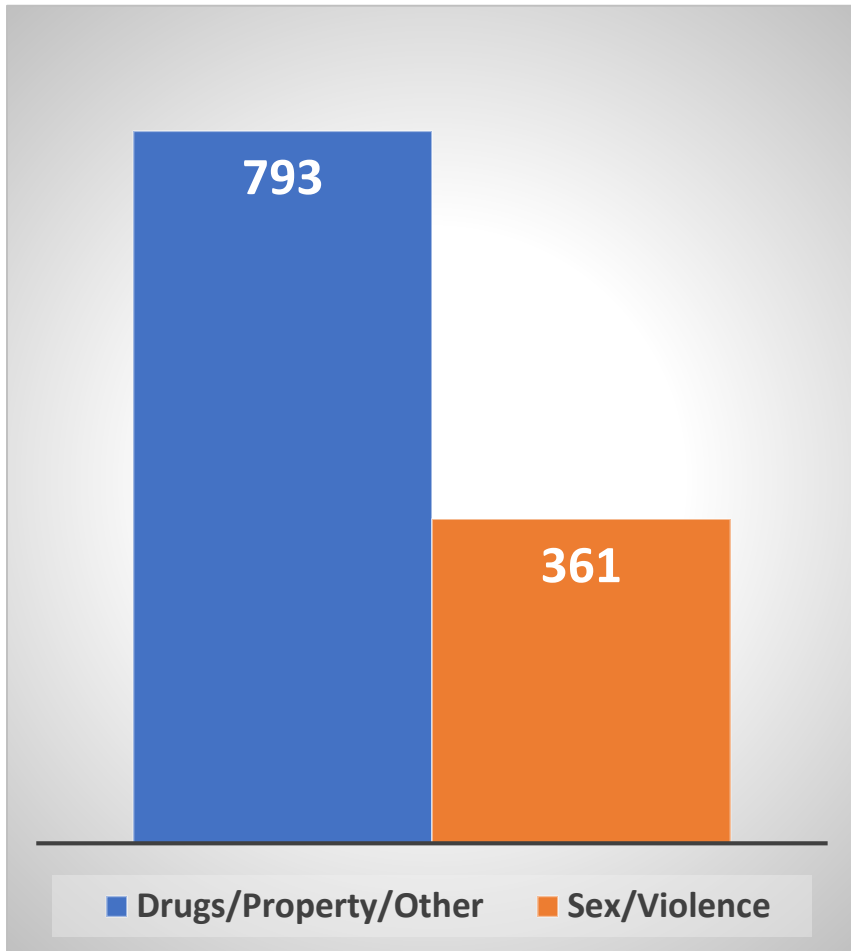
# Revocations: Months in Custody from Arrest to Commission Hearing

The average number of months an offender spends on parole before a violation resulting in arrest has increased 35% since 2015

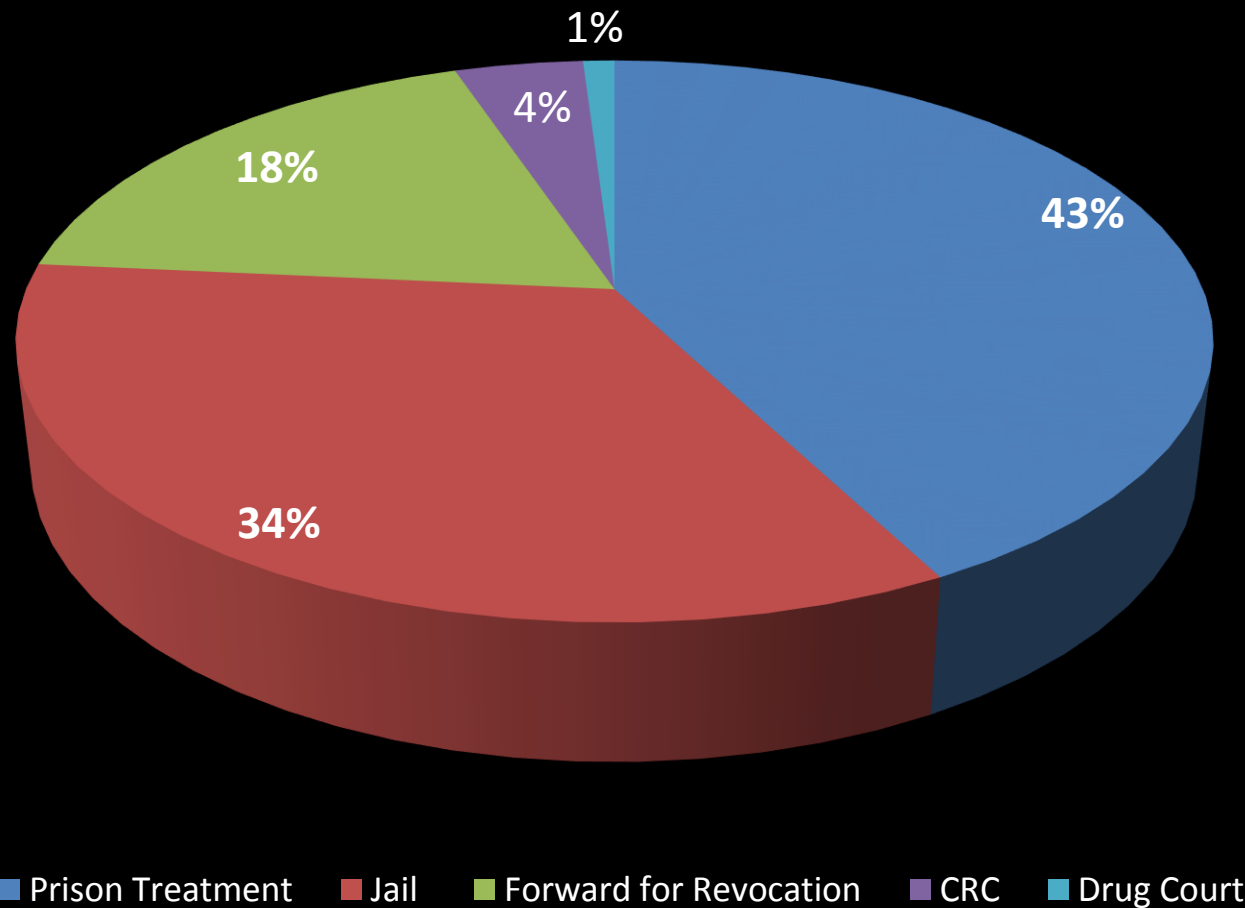




# Revocation Hearings by Offense Type of Original Conviction

# Violations: Diversion

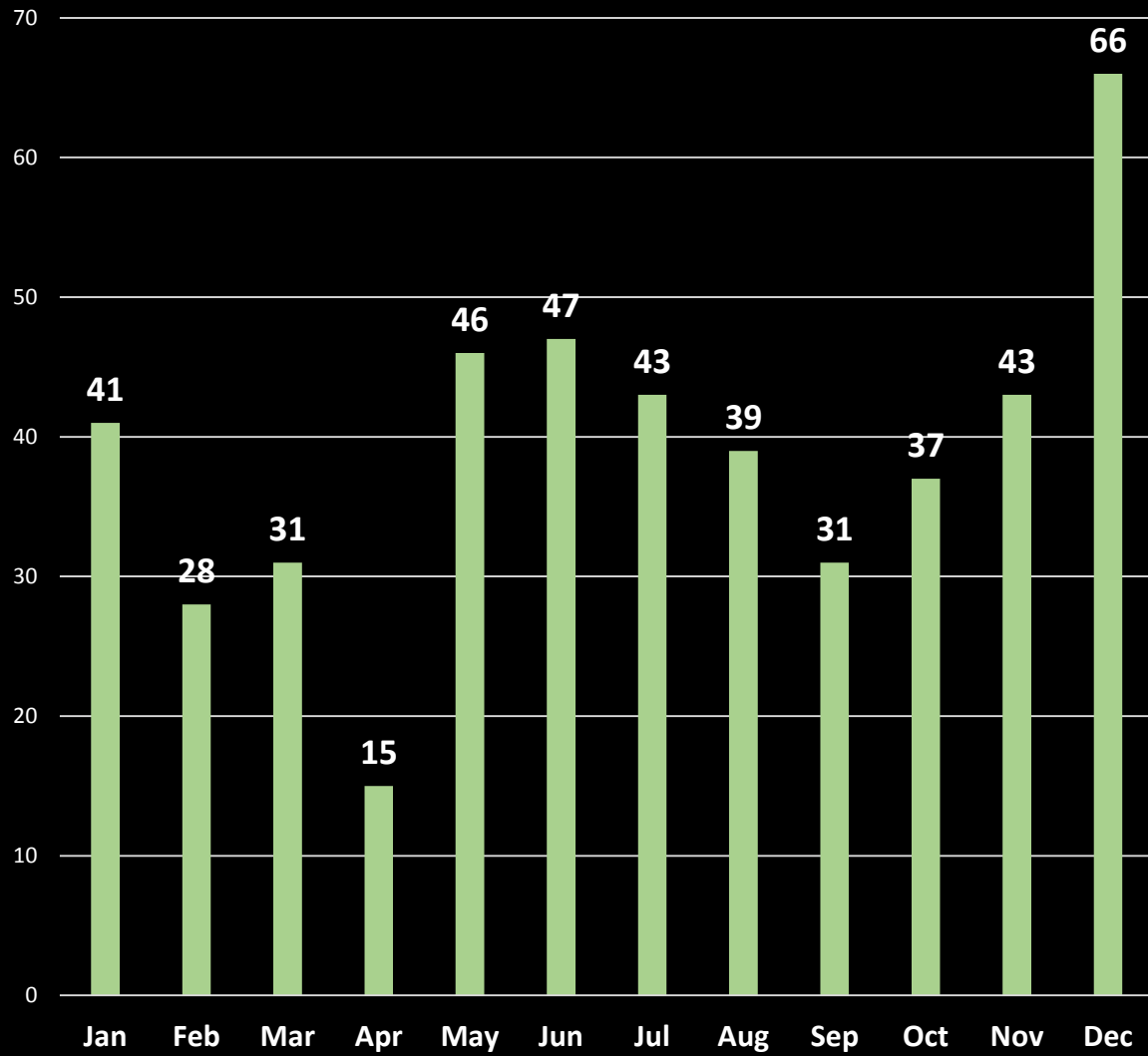


Offenders may also be recommended to attend Veterans Court, Mental Health Court, or Wood Court. However, these options to date have been utilized less than 1% respectively.

Total Diversions: 1045

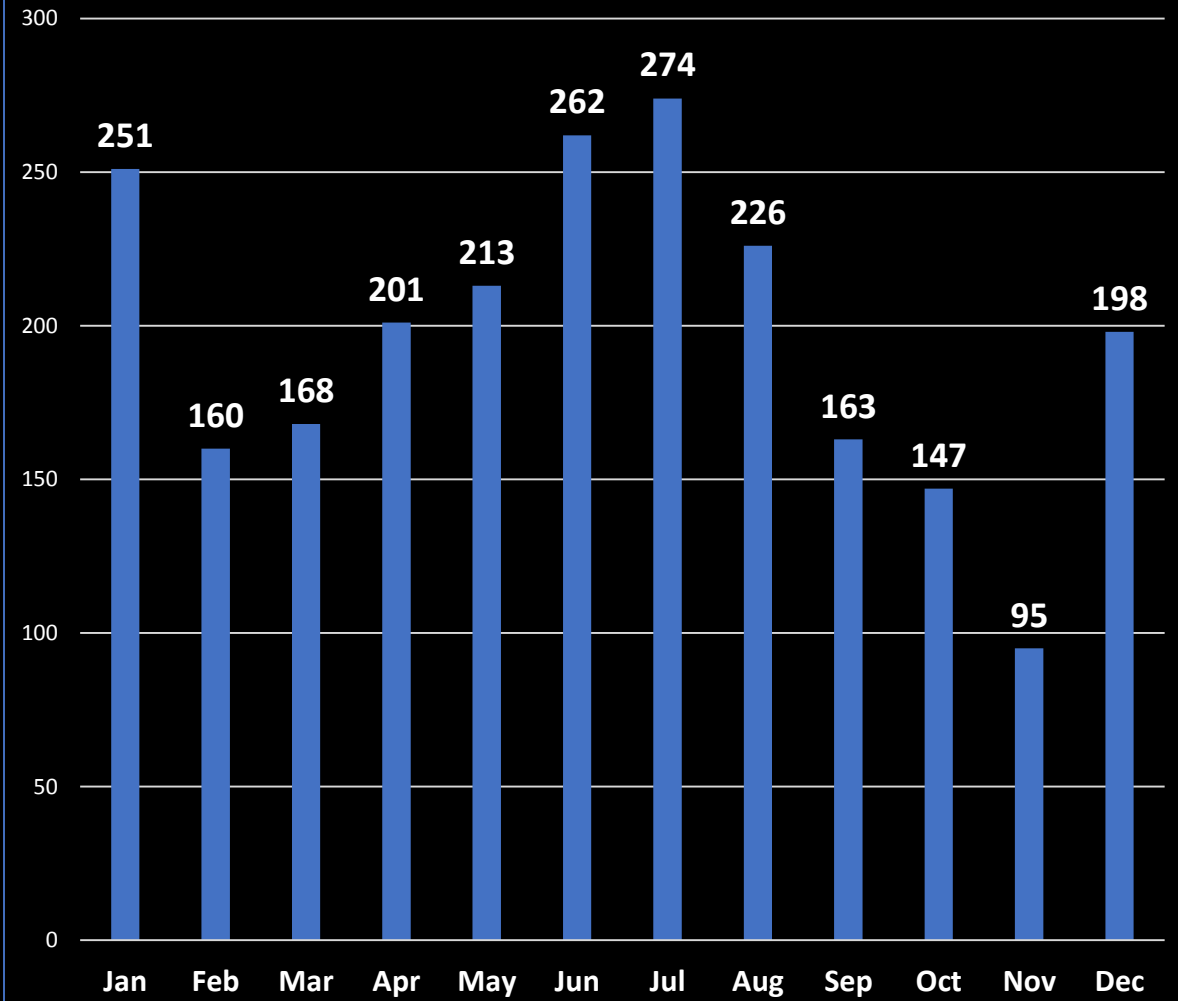


### 2018 Jail Diversion: Average Days in Custody
